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About the Artist

JEAN CHARLOT, painter and writer, was born in Paris in 1898. In 1921, he went to Mexico and participated in the first experiments with encaustic and fresco in the Escuela Preparatoria, working with Diego de Rivera at the beginnings of modern fresco painting in Mexico. He was staff artist with the Carnegie Institution of Washington's archaeological expeditions at Chichen-Itza, Yucatan, Mexico, 1926-1929. At this time he became acquainted with Dr. Sylvanus G. Morley, now Acting Director of the Museum of New Mexico. Charlot has been in the United States since 1929. Recognition of his outstanding abilities is evidenced by his having been awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship for two years for the purpose of writing up the development of modern painting in Mexico, and more recently by his having been appointed Curator of the Art Gallery of the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center.

He designed the jacket for Dr. Morley's recent book, "The Ancient Maya," and has illustrated various other works.
